
A quick guide in how to measure your ringsize

You need to properly print this pdf in order to measure correctly.


IMPORTANT! See to it that "page-scaling" is disabled in the dialogue frame of your printer.

After print-out

Measure the line below. It need to be exactly 50mm long.



Se circles at bottom page for diameter and circulum in milimeters.



Two ways of measuring ringsize

- 1. Take a ring that is designed for the finger you are supposed to wear the ring on.
 - Compare the rings inside with circles below
 - When you can see the line of the circle next to the edge of your rings inside then you have found the right size
 - If ring size is midway between two circles, choose the larger circle
- 2. Take a ring that is designed for the finger you are supposed to wear the ring on.
 - Measure the diameter, the inside dimensions of the ring with a caliper or by measuring straight across the ring with a ruler and measure the inside dimensions in mm. The number mm corresponds to your ring size.

also remember....

- not to measure the ringsize of a finger when it's cold
- always measure a fingers size in the evening when the finger is at it's greatest
- a wide ring normally needs to be in a bigger size than a narrow ring.
- be accurate, one mm equals one whole size
- do not to forget that the ring must fit over the knuckle

Measurements for ringsizes

(diameter and circulum in milimeters)
